

RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. Intending Exhibitors must ensure that Entry Forms are in the hands of the Show Secretary on or before Wednesday, **July 24th**, at the latest. One free pass will be allowed each Exhibitor whose entry fees total 2/6 or more.
- 2. All competitive horticultural exhibits must have been grown by the Exhibitors (or their gardeners under Section 'A') and shall have been the property of the Exhibitor for at least 60 days prior to the Show.
- 3. Exhibits in the Decorative, Industrial, Art, Handicrafts and Children's Classes must be the bona-fide work of the Exhibitors.
- 4. Any exhibitor may make more than one entry in a Class, and be awarded more than one prize in that Class, but he may not receive more than one prize in any one Class.
- 5. All vases, plates, baskets and linen, etc., must be provided by the Exhibitors. Plain benches only will be provided.
- 6. The Committee will take all ordinary care of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.
- 7. The tent will be open to receive exhibits from 6 p.m. until 9 p.m. on Friday, July 26th and from 7 a.m. until 10 a.m. on Saturday, July 27th.
- 8. Exhibitors will be responsible for collecting their Class Entry Card at the tent and must ensure that the relative card is placed with the exhibit in its proper class. NOTE: Exhibitors are responsible for staging and collecting their own exhibits.
- 9. The tent will be cleared in readiness for judging at 10 a.m. at which hour all Exhibitors and their assistants must leave. Only officials of the Show and Trade Exhibitors will be admitted to the tent until such time as the Judges and officials have completed their tasks in readiness for the opening of the Show.
- 10. All Exhibits must remain completely staged until 6.15 p.m. Any infringement of this rule will disqualify the Exhibitor or his or her agent from receiving any prizes or awards whatsoever.
- 11. The tent will be cleared of the public at 6 p.m. and only Exhibitors and their assistants will be re-admitted at 6.15 p.m. on production of Exhibitors' Removal Passes for the purpose of removing exhibits.
- 12. All exhibits must be removed by 6.30 p.m. and any exhibit or part thereof remaining on the benches at 6.30 p.m. will be sold to the public and the proceeds donated to The Old People's Coal Fund.
- 13. The Judges have the power to reduce the value of, or withhold any prizes where exhibits are deficient in merit.
- 14. All protests against the decision of the Judges must be made in writing to the Show Secretary by 3 p.m. on the day of the Show, accompanied by a deposit of 5/- which will be forfeited if the protest is not substantiated. There will be no appeal against the findings of the Committee.
- 15. All exhibits should be named as far as possible in the interests of visitors and cards for this purpose may be obtained in the tent. The omission of naming will not disqualify, but the Judges will recognise this distinction as telling in favour where the competition is close.
- 16. Points for individual aggregate scores will be allocated as follows: Class Nos. 1, 2, 11, 31, 52 and 99; 1st 8 points; 2nd 6 points; 3rd 4 points. Highly Commended, 2 points.

All other classes: 1st 4 points; 2nd 3 points; 3rd 2 points. Highly Commended, 1 point.

17. The winners of Challenge Cups will be required to sign a written guarantee for safe return of such Cups not later than July 1st, 1964.

- 18. Challenge Cups and Medals will be presented during the Show (approximately 5.30 p.m.). Certificates and Cash Prizes will be distributed between 4 p.m. and 6 p.m. in the Marquee.
- 19. **Definition of an Amateur.** For the purpose of this Show, the definition of an Amateur is a person who does not and who never has practised as a professional Nurseryman, Seedsman, Florist, or Market Gardener and who does not earn his livelihood at gardening.
- 20. On all questions regarding the eligibility of an Exhibitor, the decision of the Committee shall be final.
- 21. The Committee shall reserve the right to visit by commission the gardens or allotments of any Exhibitor either before or after the Show in order to verify that the Exhibitor has grown the exhibits entered for competition.
- 22. The Committee reserves the right to refuse any entry without being required to give any reason or explanation.
- 23. Important. Exhibitors should pay particular attention to the regulations of the various sections in which they are allowed to compete. Any amateur gardener or "Dowty" employee may enter in the Open Division, but only Members and associates of the Dowty Group and their families may enter in the closed Division.
- 24. Gardeners exhibiting on behalf of their employers are requested to fill in their names in the space provided on the Entry Form and the age of a child exhibitor should also be stated.
- 25. The co-operation of all Exhibitors and others concerned is requested in order to secure the due observance of these regulations and the smooth working of the show.
- 26. Information. With regard to the Exhibition, together with copies of the Schedule and Entry Forms will be supplied on request by the Show Secretary, Horticultural Section, Dowty Sports and Social Society, Arle Court, Cheltenham.
- 27. Removal of Trade Exhibits. Trade Exhibits and all property of the Exhibitors must be cleared from the marquee by 12 noon on Monday, July 29th.
- 28. Any contingency not covered by these rules and regulations shall be dealt with by the Committee and their decision shall be final.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

- 1. The term Committee in these Regulations means the Committee of the Dowty Sports and Social Society and the Committee of the Horticultural Section of the Dowty Sports and Social Society.
- 2. The Committee, its officers or servants shall not be responsible for any accident, damage, or loss however caused that may occur to any visitor, exhibitor or his servant or to any article or property brought into the Sports Ground or while entering or leaving or being carried into or out of the said Sports Ground.
- 3. Only duly authorised vehicles may be taken into the Sports Ground. The Company's car park will be open on the day of the Show.
- 4. Officers and Stewards appointed by the Committee to any position or duty will be fully authorised and empowered by the Committee to carry out their instructions.

HINTS FOR EXHIBITORS

1. When the flowers are gathered for the Show they should be cut the day before and immediately plunged into water. Take the vase to the garden with you and let them stay in the water until it is time to pack them. If possible, pack the flowers in an airtight box lined with greaseproof paper. In the case of sprays of flowers such as Sweet Peas, etc., and spikes of Gladioli, the top flowers should be half open and the bottom ones just fully open.

2. Take to the Show a little more than you require in case of mishaps,

and do not use poor quality material.

3. Take great care that you follow the schedule carefully, with regard to the selection of foliage you should use, and the number and type of flowers which should be exhibited. Foliage should not be too heavy and great care should be taken in the arrangement.

- 4. Please use appropriate sized vases, not jam jars and other ugly receptacles, and remember that the vase should be hidden as much as possible and the flowers arranged loosely and not packed tight. If bowls are used, the flower stalks should be held firm by soft packing paper or moss, etc. Remember to take your own vases and bowls as these are not provided.
- 5. When arranging collections of flowers or vegetables remember that some black cloth or velvet is a great advantage and will show up the colours.
- 6. Groups of vegetables should always contain potatoes and the collections generally contain the same number of specimens of vegetables as that required for the individual classes. Utilize the space allotted to the best advantage and garnish the exhibit with parsley, mint, etc., where this is allowed. Arrangement finish and a well balanced exhibit often gain additional points. A good strain of seeds is essential to produce good vegetables.

7. GENERAL HINTS OF SELECTION OF VEGETABLES FOR THE SHOW BENCH.

Runner Beans and Dwarf Beans should be straight, of good colour, long fleshy and uniform in size.

Peas should be uniform in size, large, deep green, young, well filled, the skin free from blemishes and bloom showing to advantage.

Carrots should be of good colour and free from fangs, depressions and side roots.

Beet. Colour uniform and medium size should be the chief points.

Onions. Specimens should be large, even sized, well shaped and with a thin neck.

Salad Onions must be shown with roots and leaves.

Potatoes. Evenly matched in size and shape, true to type, free from blemish with clear skins and eyes few and shallow.

Cauliflowers of good size, high quality, uniformity, compactness and freedom from blemish.

Cabbage should have firm hearts and be of medium size and good colour.

Marrows should be fresh and tender and perfectly matched in size and

Tomatoes should be uniform in size and shape, good colour, clear skin, firm, and shown with the calvy

firm, and shown with the calyx.

Fruit should be firm, retain its bloom and not be over ripe.

Fruit should be firm, retain its bloom and not be over tipe.

8. Follow the schedule carefully. Prizes are often lost through carlessness, so pay particular attention to quantities and varieties required.

NOTE—The difference between kinds and varieties. For example Asters and Antirrhinums are different kinds of flowers whilst Majestic potatoes and King Edward's are different varieties.

Judging will be conducted under the R.H.S. Code of Rules.

THE JUDGING OF FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

In assessing the merits of exhibits of fruit and vegetables the following features are generally considered by the judges:—condition, size, uniformity and colour. The following definitions will therefore be of interest—

CONDITION, i.e. Cleanliness, freshness, tenderness and presence or absence of coarseness and blemishes.

SIZE, i.e. Size is only meritous if accompanied by quality.

UNIFORMITY, i.e. The state of being alike in size, form and colour.

ALLOCATION OF POINTS

For the purpose of this exhibition, the number of fruits and vegetables required to form a specimen exhibit, together with the maximum points allowed in Judging are as follows:

The "Duncan" Annual Challenge Cup with Plaque for the highest number of points in Section "E" (closed division) with the exception of class 98.

The "Bound" Annual Challenge Cup with Replica for the best exhibit in class 115 Section "E" (closed division).

The "Mills" Floral Trophy with Replica for the highest number of points in classes 97 to 111 inclusive. Section "E" (closed division).
